Our focus on Explicit Teaching and the development of a comprehensive English Scope and Sequence and associated documents have supported a strong improvement in student learning.

This was recognised in the Certificate of Academic Excellence presented to Falls Road Primary in 2021 and cosigned by the Minister of Education and the Director General of Education.

Falls Road is an excellent school that continues to provide a wide variety of opportunities so that all students, staff and community members can "Challenge the Present and Create the Future".

Our Mission Statement

To provide students with a positive educational environment that facilitates, supports and extends all facets of a student's development.

Celebrating Achievements

Achievement of Students:

Parents are informed of their child's academic, social and physical progress, the development of their creative skills and abilities and their emotional development using a variety of methods. These include communications through class parent information meetings, individual parent meetings, Parent Open Nights, whole school reporting to parents where the school closes for a half day in mid-term one, learning journeys, portfolios, parent videos and semester based summative reports.

Our NAPLAN results were impressive and we received a Certificate "Recognition of Academic Excellence 2021" from the Minister of Education and the Director General.

Arts:

This program is a strong feature of our school with all children in Years 1 - 6 having time allocated to spend with Mrs Perkins in Visual Arts. Wonderful artwork is displayed in an exhibition on Parent Open Night with every student having 2 to 3 pieces displayed and can also be seen displayed in classrooms and Administration. The creative and visually stunning work is regularly commented on by visitors to the school. Excellent outcomes are also being achieved by the children.

Students continue to achieve great outcomes in Music and this is thanks to the dedication and enthusiastic teaching program run by Ms Johnston.

Physical Education and Sport:

Students are involved in a range of sporting activities through in-school activities and in interschool competitions. The Physical Education program in Year 1 – Year 4 focuses on the development of Fundamental Movement Skills while the Year 5 and Year 6 program focuses on applying these skills specifically to different sports such as Cricket, T-ball, Hockey, Basketball, Netball and Soccer.

Students are also provided with the opportunity to participate in a variety of interschool competitions across a range of sports and year levels. These activities and competitions have provided a range of highlights throughout the year.

Parents & Citizens:

This is an extremely active and effective group. Regular meetings are well attended and P&C contributions are well planned and generous. The P&C is an integral part of the school and is held in very high regard by the community.

Volunteer Helpers:

Parents support class activities, carnivals, special days, fundraising, Quiz Night and Moonlight Markets. Mentors assist the students' academic, practical and social interaction skills in conjunction with the teachers. This level of support is greatly appreciated by everyone at the school.

Literacy Pro:

In 2021 Literacy Pro continued to be funded by the P&C. The program built on the wonderful start in 2016 and it has provided students with an opportunity to independently monitor their reading progress. The purchase of 700 books by the P&C added to the range of books at the school which were also on the Literacy Pro list. We now have over 4,000 books and this resource is definitely promoting and encouraging immersion in independent student reading. With students having the option to choose their own texts, they are taking a greater interest in their reading and they are reading more for enjoyment.

Whilst assessment is not the focus, teachers and parents have the option to monitor student progress in the reading program through online reviews of the books they read on a periodic basis. Students also have the option to increase their Lexile reading score by completing comprehension tests as their understandings develop.

The school and P&C have committed to continue to resource the program by purchasing 200 additional books each year.

Transition Program:

Transitions are organised from Kindergarten to Pre Primary, Pre Primary to Year 1 and Year 6 to High School to assist students to move confidently into their next year of school. These transitions are very well planned and ensure that student engagement is maintained at a high level. Both our local Senior High Schools work very closely with us to ensure that the move to High School is successful and as stress free as possible.

Year 6 Camp:

Due to COVID, the Year 6 Camp was unable to be held in Sydney and Canberra as per previous years. We were very fortunate in being able to organise a camp to Pinjarra in the same scheduled week. The students and parents were very appreciative that we were able to organise the camp with all the challenges that the Pandemic created. The students had a wonderful time.

The tradition of camp, which has been lost in many public schools, is very much a part of the Falls Road culture and the camp was a memorable experience for all students. The experience provided extended opportunities for leadership, independence and personal growth.

Our students were brilliant Ambassadors for our school receiving compliments on their behaviour and courteous manner.

School Profile

SCHOOL STAFF

Falls Road Primary has very experienced teaching staff. We have 19 teachers, 11 full time and 8 part-time and 2 administrators. We have 5 teachers from the School of Instrumental Music (SIMS) visit our school to teach students Clarinet, Flute, Brass, Violin and Guitar. We also employ a School Psychologist to support our staff and students.

There were 21 non-teaching staff positions including a Manager of Corporate Services, School Officer, 11 Education Assistants, 1 Library Officer, 1 Gardener /Handyperson and 3 Cleaners.

All staff have a current Working with Children clearance. These requirements to work with children are checked on an ongoing basis.

- Outside of school time when we employ relief staff to facilitate their attendance

The school amount acquitted for teachers was \$14,183 and non-teaching was \$584.

Building and Grounds


Work has continued around the school. A new Administration extension was completed in 2021.

The Finance Committee meets to set and then regularly review the Annual Budget. The School Board endorses the budget, reflecting the focus areas of the school to meet the needs of the students.







Grade allocation by Year level for Semester Two 2021






















Falls Road Primary P and C Association Report 2021

2021 was a year of transition for the Falls Road P&C. Several long-time members retired from their roles on the committee or indicated their intention to retire in 2022, as their child reached the end of their time at Falls Road. A need to decentralize the burden of P&C events from a few core volunteers was also identified and ever-changing Covid regulations continued to affect the school and the boarder community. Thus, our focus in 2021 was to priorities a smaller number of high value P&C events and encourage new families to become involved.

There were still several excellent events and fundraisers that took place during the year, including:

During 2021 the P&C supported several ongoing expenditures at school including online subscriptions for all students and medals and ribbons for sports and swimming carnivals. Several spending requests from teachers to improve the student's comfort and experience at school were also fulfilled. These included a picnic table for outdoor learning, easels, floor seating, a floor rug for the music room, a STEM standing table and learning boards. The P&C also contributed to the upgrade to the junior reading room with the purchase of more decodable readers.

2021 was a relatively quiet year for the P&C as major fundraising events were avoided due to the risk of last-minute cancellations caused by Covid shut-downs. We have a focus on sharing the load and recruiting new members.

We are confident that this will be successful, as several new families have become involved and at the 2022 AGM we will be looking to fill many key roles including president, secretary, treasurer and fundraising coordinator with new members.

We have also been continually supported by others at the school and in the community, and for that support, the P&C continues to be extremely grateful. P&C meetings continue to be held twice a term on Monday evenings in Week 3 and Week 8 and new members are always welcomed warmly.

Again, the School continued to operate in a financially sound and healthy position, a position that has been consistently maintained over many years. This is a significant achievement, particularly during the financial challenges that COVID 19 presented. The School Board certainly appreciates and acknowledges the immense work that goes into the effective management of the budgets through the dedication by Brenda Martin, David and Simon. Their diligent work allows the School to maintain and continue with the various ongoing School Programs that continue to benefit the children.

The 2020-2022 Business Plan was progressively reviewed by the School Board during 2021. This Business Plan is a key foundation for aligning the available resources for the School to provide the required guidance for improved student outcomes through enhanced teaching and learning.
